Britain's King George III wrote the day's activities in his diary: "July 4, 1776-Nothing happened today." Nothing happened? America was born that day, King George. Her birth marked an epoch in history for the cause of human freedom.



Today we continue to be the longest on-going Constitutional Republic in the history of the world and we need to understand that blessings such as these are not by chance or accidental. They are from God. John Adams said, "The general principles on which the fathers achieved independence were the general principles of Christianity." Adams went on to say that in observing the 4th of July, "It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty." Preserving American liberty depends upon our understanding of the foundations on which this great country was built and then preserving those principles upon which it was founded. Woodrow Wilson once declared, "A nation which does not remember what it was yesterday, does not know what it is today, or what it is trying to do." "For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1).

He calls us to live in faith toward Him and in fervent love for our neighbor. He calls us to put the gifts He gives to us in His service. God calls parents provide for their children and raise them in the fear and admonition of the Lord.

And God calls children to honor their parents and provide and care for them when they are no longer able to do so themselves. God calls the government to punish those who do evil and to reward those who do good. He calls citizens to pay their taxes and honor the governing officials as God's servants. 

UPCOMING EVENTS





program in 2018, and then on to its current status in this

noteworthy 100th Anniversary of Redeemer.

Faithful Friends "FAITHFUL FRIENDS -

Seven years ago, a longtime member of the congregation felt a calling from the heart to start a ministry for the elderly to connect with those who were homebound or living in care facilities and residences. Sensing the loneliness and isolation these loyal members must feel, the idea was presented to Pastor Randy, and with his blessing, a small committee of Redeemer members was formed. "Faithful Friends - A Heart for Seniors" was on its way ready for "post time". As the Lord would have it, those drawn to the Committee felt personal connections through their own experiences with elderly parents or relatives.

Ideas and activities came easily with an action plan assigning a volunteer Redeemer member as a "Faithful Friend" to a shut-in or care facility resident. With God's grace guiding, there was an immediate response of volunteers and seniors interested in the program. Personal visits, phone calls, cards, small gifts, devotionals, and prayers built a strong bond between the "Friends" – a Volunteer and their special Senior. When the Lord opens a window, the breeze of love, care, and a servant's heart gently opens many more.

Today, Faithful Friends graciously boasts over 25 Volunteers befriending nearly 30 Seniors. As the Faithful Friends Ministry grew, opportunities for fellowship, service, personal growth, and exchange of ideas for eldercare emerged. Three or four Educational/Enrichment Resource presentations are held throughout the year, with recent topics including: In Home Elder Care – "Seniors Helping Seniors" presented by Dawn Neally; "Estate Planning and Wills" presented by member David Mammel; and "Long-Term Care and Legal Rights" by member Erin Mortensen. Presentations are taped and online on the Redeemer website. In addition, we are also blessed to have an inhouse expert on Eldercare, member Diane Johns. The Faithful Friends Ministry Team sends cards to all our Senior friends every holiday and birthday, plus one-year memorial cards to families of our departed friends.

Our primary mission and goal is to honor every elderly member of our Redeemer congregation with the love, joy, and comfort they deserve. We hope to celebrate many more anniversaries along with our church family, Lutheran Church of the Redeemer. 

GIVE:

FROM GENERATION TO GENERATION: REDEEMER'S WORSHIP AND STAFF MINISTRY OVER THE YEARS

"One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts." - Psalm 145:4

WORSHIP - "Worship the Lord with reverence." Psalm 2:11a

We come to church to worship our God. It is a holy and sanctified experience. It is what draws us closer to Him and reminds us of what it means to be children of God. It gives us the opportunity to pause and spend time in His presence, focusing on what we as Christians can do to be good disciples. There are many people who help to make our worship services special.

Greeters are the first people that we meet when entering the doors on Sunday morning. Peter Bokmiller led this program for many years. The goal is to extend a warm welcome to familiar faces and to those newcomers that are looking for a new church home.

The next person you might see on a Sunday morning is an **Usher**, ready to hand you a bulletin for the morning service. Over the decades, ushers also have had a vital role in our worship services. An old ushering manual notes that the ushers are "Mr. Redeemer" to our members! "Their purpose is to maintain a reverent and worshipful atmosphere to all persons." Back in the day, ushers were to wear a dark blue or black suit, white shirt, black shoes, and the "usher tie," which was navy blue with polka dots. The ushers escorted congregants to their seats and were to have a "cheerful attitude." The Usher's Manual had diagrams for collecting the offering and for communion. Our ushers are also trained in what to do in case of a medical emergency. More recently, the Family Ushering program started where a family takes over the duties of the ushers, providing a great opportunity for them to participate in the worship service together.

During the service, there are many lay people that assist the Pastors in worship. Our **Acolyte** program began in the late 70's. Clara Bailey fabricated all of the Acolyte stoles that were worn by the Crossbearers. She made at least 24, and they took 2-1/2 hours per stole! The processional cross was a memorial gift donated by the family of Ben S. Hawkins. In 1976, the first group of acolytes and crossbearers received a silver cross and red braid in recognition of their service. The group included Debi Hollis and Eric Rolf!

Another group of people who assist on Sundays are our **Lay Readers**, our **AV Operators**, and the **Board of Elders** who help during Communion.

For decades, the **Altar Guild** has been comprised of many God-fearing women. Under the current leadership of Karen Pridmore and Kathy Eley, they are responsible for setting up the Sacraments for Holy Communion, including wafers, and cups and goblets that are filled with wine and grape juice. These elements are not sanctified until the Words of Institution are spoken over them. After the service, they take time and care to properly wash and re-store these elements. Pastor Duane used to hold each cup up to each communicant's mouth! He had perfected the technique and not many drips occurred. Today we also offer the common cup. The Altar Guild is also responsible for filling the candles, laundering linens, and maintaining the pews by checking the pencils and refilling the cards.

During our worship, the **Sanctuary Lamp** is lit in memory of those saints who have gone on before us. Our Sanctuary Lamp was given by the Elders and Pastor Randy in 2000 in loving memory of Rev. Theodore Wuggazer and Rev. Duane Wuggazer, and is a constant reminder to the people of Redeemer that our God is always present and will never abandon us.

Worship services also include **Pastoral Acts**: baptisms, weddings, and funerals. Our faith journey begins with Baptism, when we enter the family of God. Everyone's personal journey then culminates with their own Confirmation, which currently has its own service to celebrate this special moment in their lives. "Confirmation helps a baptized child through Word and Sacrament to identify more deeply with the Christian community and to participate more fully in its missions" (Lamp, Meinert, 1974). Weddings take on special meaning by celebrating the couples being joined together in God's kingdom, and funerals for those families honoring their loved ones who have gone to live with Jesus with special services and remembrances.

Up until 1970, Redeemer had two services: 9:30am and 11:00am. September 13, 1970 marked the first Contemporary service at 8:30am. This service caused a bit of controversy – it used guitars and "folktype" music. An article in the Lamp explained that, "Experimentation is good. Change is good. It is easy to get into ruts and make worship habitual rather than exciting and meaningful." Gene Guettler, one of our youth choir directors, led the service with his voice and guitar. He got many young people interested in guitar and brought them into the service. After Gene left, a group of young people led the service.

Redemption was a worship service that also followed a different path. Mark Wuggazer started Next-Gen Confirmation, which was held on Wednesday nights. Following dinner, choir, and confirmation instruction, an "Emergent Movement" worship service was held in the gym. Redemption was marketed as, "same, but different". There was a great band, and the creeds, liturgies, and prayers interwoven.

Redeemer's special worship services are so uplifting. We celebrate All Saints Day (formerly our Day of Memory) with candles that are lit by our congregants in memory of their loved ones. **Reformation** in October is about celebrating our Lutheran heritage and Martin Luther. Thanksgiving has flags, special music, and beautiful hymns. **Christmas Eve** is simply breathtaking. We continue to sing the last verse of Silent Night in German; to celebrate our German heritage and as a tradition that Pastor Duane Wuggazer began, and Pastor Randy has continued. **Easter**, the joy of the Resurrection, with its beautiful flowers and cross made of flowers, is spectacular. The "Hallelujah Chorus" resounds throughout the Sanctuary as members of the congregation join the choir. Pastor Randy instituted a "Pet Blessing" service that takes place on the front lawn on a Sunday in September. During the season of Lent, our Wednesday services are held in the Chapel and have a theme that carries through the season.

Our worship services are greatly enhanced by our music ministry. We will do a deep dive into that ministry in November, but for now we will reference Psalm 98:1 to remind all of the blessings of music in our worship: "Sing to the Lord a new song, for He has done marvelous things."

MINISTRY STAFF

Redeemer has been blessed with a successful, growing congregation over these last 100 years in large part due to our staff. From our early years with **Pastor Schuessler**, to our current years with **Pastor Randy**, the staff has played a vital role in running smooth programs for our congregants.

In 1966, **Bill Meinert** was our Director of Christian Education. He came from a position at Ford Motor on a handshake from Pastor Ted. Bill oversaw our Sunday School, School of Religion, Kamp, and Youth Group. Over the years, countless members from our Youth Group still remember him fondly as one of their best Christian mentors. Several of his assistants such as JoAnn Tylicki and Lee Western helped Bill when he felt that he needed some younger people who could relate to the youth.

Marge Noettl worked with the Women's Ministry and the Grand Group. By the late 1980's she was instrumental in starting our beloved Advent by Candlelight.

Cary Richert came to us as the Minister of Discipleship in 1985. His signature program was Stephen Ministry, which we will highlight during Congregational Care month. In the late 1990's, Cary heard the call of the Holy Spirit and attended Seminary. In 2001, when he was ordained, he became our Assistant Pastor and was revered for his Bible studies and his way of teaching the lessons of the Bible.

Dottie Reiher came to Redeemer from Our Shepherd in 1987, and helped fill some of the shoes of Bill Meinert when he retired. She was our Minister of Children and Family Life.

In 1991, **Joe Werner** was hired to take over as our full-time Minister to Children, Family Life and Youth. Joe was instrumental in his work with our marriage ministry, Sunday School, and the beginning of our Mexicali Mission Trips.

We have had several part-time staffers in charge of Lay Ministry. In the early 1990s, **Cindi Mills** filled this role and then **Cindy Grove** took over. **Sharon Sweet** was hired as fulltime Minister of Music and Lay Ministry in 1994, and Cindy Grove then moved to Senior Ministry. In 1995, it was announced that after annual reviews, it came to light that Cindy and Sharon's gifts and talents would be better served if they changed areas of ministry, so Sharon took on Senior Ministry while Cindy went back to Lay Ministry.

Kitty Sweitzer was a volunteer and part-time staff member for years until she was hired as full-time Minister of Children's Ministry, Evangelism, and Outreach in 1995. What a blessing she was to our children in that role! Kitty later moved her focus to Women's Ministry and leads the Advent by Candlelight program. Her gift of storytelling is a highlight of the evening. Over the years Kitty has been tireless in her work for God's kingdom. From teaching at Westmaple, leading Women's Ministry, VBS, and planning the wonderful 100th Anniversary luncheon on June 1, she has been a constant and steady presence in our hallways and hearts.

In 2015, **Nicole Olds**, a member since she was small, took over the reins of Children's Ministry from Kitty Sweitzer. She now heads up Sunday School, VBS, Mom's Day Out, and so much more. You will see her every Sunday during the children's sermon waiting to escort the children of Redeemer to Sunday school.

In 2000, **Gary Priskorn** was hired as Minister of Family Life and was asked to take on the additional role of Minister of Discipleship in 2001 once Cary Richert was ordained. He eventually took the lead on Men's Ministry and has developed a great bond with the men of Redeemer through the Wednesday morning men's Bible study and events such as Bocce Ball and the Silversides Tour. Gary's birthday phone calls to each member of Redeemer are a treasured source of joy. In his retirement brochure, Gary is called a faith-filled man and one of the greatest handymen you'll ever know. Yes, Gary retired from full-time Ministry in 2012, but he is the most "unretired" man we know.

In 2004, **Joanna Newman** came to Redeemer as an intern. She brought so much energy, enthusiasm, and creativity and was hired full-time in 2005 as our Minister of Discipleship. Joanna was responsible for teaching 6th grade confirmation and creating curriculum, teaching and planning Bible Studies, Stewardship, visitor follow-up, and running the prayer ministry.

In 2000, **Rev. Mark Wuggazer** found his calling and came on our staff full-time as Minister of Youth. After Mark was ordained, he was our Youth Pastor. Mark made a significant impact in the lives of the youth, inspiring 4 young men to enter the seminary. His impact on the youth group during the Mexicali mission trips could be considered his hallmark achievement at Redeemer. Today, our youth groups are led by **Laura Vowell**, Middle School, and **Gia Scheidt**, High School, who grew up in our church. **Eric Wisniewski** came to youth group as a guest of one of our members and stayed on to assist Gia in leading the High School Ministry.

When Mark Wuggazer left to become a senior pastor, **Laura Vowell**, a life-long member and **Joel Brockberg** were hired as Youth Directors. In 2017, Laura came on our staff full-time and is our Director of Middle School Ministry, Family Life, and Outreach. When we had a change in staff, she added Confirmation to her job description!

Elisa Stephens was our Director of Fellowship in 2000, and **Kim Davis** holds position now. Kim heads up our Sunday morning coffee hours. as well as the homecoming picnic. You'll find her calm presence on Sundays, filling our snack trays and making sure everyone enjoys their fellowship time between services.

Andrea Schlak took on the interim Director of Outreach position in 2011. Additionally, she ran the confirmation program as well as being Westmaple Nursery Director. Her guiding force has made each of these programs run smoothly and effectively. She is now head of Redeemer's 100th Anniversary Celebration Committee.

Redeemer offers Christian counseling services and the program has been run by **Sandy Pourcho**. You'll read more about this in August when we focus on Congregational Care.

Last, but not least, we have those who work behind the scenes to keep Redeemer running. In 1969, the office of Parish Administrator was created, and **Edward Nuelkin** functioned as the business manager, manager of the buildings and grounds, public relations manager, organizational consultant, and policy. **Stan Kelley** and **Jeanne Krauss** also served as Parish Administrators.

In the 1970s **Joe O'Connor** was our full-time custodian. He walked around church with his cigar and did maintenance and cleaning. We had live-in caretakers during that time, and they lived in the apartment which was located where the Town Square is now! **Steve Schuetz** took care of our building for many years along with Lenny Paczkowski. Our current maintenance person, **Fred Suczynski**, is a godsend when something needs to be done. Fred will be retiring soon and his presence will be dearly missed!

Our monthly newsletter, The Lamp, was initially written by Pastor Ted. Pastor Duane took over after the death of his father, and when he became too busy, Kris Held, Pam Dundas, and Amy Strumolo became our editors. It is now handled by our current office staff.

Our financial and accounting staff has been comprised of **Diana Schultz**, **Keri Peck**, **Julie Branigan**, **Barb Herzog**, **Lisa Doeden**, **and Laura Jones**. They keep our church treasurer up to date on anything financial!

Last, but certainly not least, is our office staff. Where would we be without them? Mrs. Gassoway served as our Church Secretary for a very long time without pay, until in 1951, she began receiving a salary of \$100 per month! Grace Schroeder was the driving force behind Pastor Ted and Pastor Duane. She ran that office with such efficiency – all by herself. Pastor Duane commented that when his eyesight was failing, he couldn't have done his job without the secretary and wedding hostess! Some secretaries throughout the years were: Ruth Bandelin, Julie Branigan, Anne Earle, Lisa Maki, Sue Bishop, and Nancy Smith. Pam Tyndall and Therese Scheidt were so valuable to our office staff and we were so sad to lose them this past year.

Our current Church Office Staff – **Rose Kiehle** and **Carrie Morris** are the glue that holds this church together. They have many volunteers to help, but they produce bulletins and the Lamp, schedule everything, and help keep Pastor Randy organized. We are so thankful and grateful for everything they do!

COUNSELING CORNER

When I was younger I would eagerly await the 4th of July fireworks. Now, as years have gone by, I find that I don't have the same excitement as I did previously to watch them light up the sky. My dogs go into paranoid mode finding a place of refuge when the firecrackers begin. All of the sky noise that is relative to the 4th is actually deleterious to our dog's emotional state of security, safety, and comfort.

I think children feel the same emotions of insecurity, danger, and discomfort when they are witness to "fireworks" in the marriage. Most of us begin our marriages with "white lace and promises and a kiss for luck and we are on our way" (Karen Carpenter). As time evolves throughout the marriage there can be changes in career, health, finances, or responsibilities, and ultimately our emotional needs and objectives can be challenged. We lose our perspective. There are a few things that can be immediately implemented to help the children feel more secure and settle down (if they are acting out in misbehavior).

Parents-do NOT disagree with your spouse's parenting style or discipline modality in front of the children. You will undermine their authority in front of the kids which will add to more confusion and bad behavior. It is my belief that this can slowly damage a marriage. Remember, your spouse comes FIRST-NOT your kids. If the marriage breaks, what do they have then? By all means, please discuss and come to agreement whatever concerns you have with each other in private...outside, in the car, or when kids are asleep in bed.

Always present a united front when dealing with the kids in any way.

Affirm that you love them, continually bending down and making eye and physical contact with the child.

Remember that YOU are the parent and giving the child too much leeway in making decisions for themselves can be unfruitful and deleterious to the family order and, their (age appropriate) maturation development process. They will test the fence line. No doubt. Make sure it is ALWAYS on!! Meaning, be consistent with boundaries and violation of consequences thereof.

I must tell you I think a lot of us got rebooted in our thinking about the nature of our relationship and expectations we have with our husbands. 
