# STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

# POINTING TO THE ROCK OF AGES

Not the labor of my hands Can fulfill Thy Law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears forever flow, All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and Thou alone. (LSB 761:2)

While the classic hymn "Rock of Ages" shows up in the Lutheran Service Book in the "Hope and Comfort" section, it can also teach us a valuable lesson about Christian stewardship. If that surprises you, stay with me on this one.

No Lutheran would ever dispute the fact that our work does not save us. Ephesians 2 makes it truly clear that we are dead in our trespasses and sins and would remain in that state until Christ raises us by grace. There is not a ladder on which we can climb out of the grave that our sins have dug for us. No blood, sweat nor tears will be able to rescue us. We all know this.

Our works do not save. Christ's work on the cross of Calvary does! He bore human flesh. He carried the burden of our sin to the cross. His body was beaten, bruised and bloodied for us. He has indeed atoned for us! This is more than enough reason for this hymn to be bouncing around in your head all day today!

But our work has a place. The place is in response to what the Father has done for us in Jesus. The Rock of Ages, who is Jesus, becomes the foundation on which our lives of faith are built. The Holy Spirit uses the means of grace to make us God's workmanship that Paul talks about in Ephesians 2:10.

Our workmanship does not display our power or prowess. Like the heavens declare the handiwork of the Creator, the works of a redeemed sinner point others to the salvation that is worked only by Jesus alone. Our work is a response to and reflection of a grace and glory that we ourselves could never accomplish or achieve.

We become stewards of the treasure that is the Gospel. When we faithfully support the work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our financial support, we are doing the work which points to the One who alone atones. When we come alongside a struggling sister or brother for whom Christ died and we share the stewardship work of compassion and care, we enflesh the treasure of God's love and redemption. When we make it a weekly priority to arrange our schedule to be in the Lord's House with other stewards of the Gospel to receive again and again the Gospel's precious gift, we are stewards of the Body of Christ in the congregation that points even more people to Jesus.

We cannot do this. Jesus does it through us. We are simply stewards of this precious treasure!







**Happy November!** This is the season to give thanks for what we have and prepare for the coming of Christmas. Whether you are busy with the hustle and bustle of family, friends and activities or begin to settle in to winter and quiet days at home, the Redeemer library has much to offer.

The movie, <u>An Old-Fashioned Thanksgiving</u>, is based upon a short story by Little Women author, Louisa May Alcott. Isabella Caldwell is a high-society woman in late-1800's New York. When Isabella's estranged daughter Mary becomes ill and is too proud to ask her mother for assistance, Mary's daughter, Tilly, takes it upon herself to contact her grandmother and plead for help. Isabella's arrival causes an upheaval in many lives, but may also lead to reconciliation within the family.

<u>Thank You for Thanksgiving</u> by Dandi Daley Mackall is a beautlifly written children's book that perfectly captures the flury of activity and the loving calm of a family Thanksgiving dinner. Timmy struggles with what he will say at the dinner table knowing he will be last in line to share what he is thankful for this Thanksgiving but hearing the prayers of each person seated at the table gives Timmy inspiration for the perfect prayer.

The Sisters of Sinai: How Two Lady Adventurers Discovered the Hidden Gospels by Janet Soskice is a fascinating true story of the discovery of the world's earliest known copy of the Gospels. In 1892, Agnes and Margaret Smith, twin sisters from Scotland were combing the library of St. Catherine's Monastery at Mount Sinai when they found a neglected palimpsest containing the Gospels written in ancient Syriac, the language that Jesus spoke, making it one of the most important scriptural discoveries of modern times.



"Oh, sing to the Lord a new song, for He has done marvelous things! Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth in joyous song and sing praises! Sing praises to the Lord with the lyre, with the lyre and the sound of melody! With trumpets and the sound of the horn make a joyful noise before the King, the Lord!"

Psalm 98: 1a, 4-6.

Lutherans are known for the beautiful music that enhances our worship services. Singing hymns as a congregation accompanied by the innumerable tones of a magnificent organ enhances our choirs as they elegantly harmonize their voices in hymns, psalms and liturgy. Martin Luther considered music to be "the excellent gift of God" and held that "next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." We hope our music is indeed a gift we return to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ and to our congregation. It was wisely recommended in a 1950's Redeemer church newsletter: "You will profit and so will your church, if you will agree to sing in the choir. We have 425 communicants, 10% of them in the choir should be a fair goal. This is missionwork in its finest sense: A good choir attracts worshippers. It gives the right background for the message of the Word." Well said back in the 50's and it's a sure bet today!

Our first pastor, the Reverend Luther Schuessler's granddaughter, Gay Wolf, related that her mom, Esther, played the original pump organ in the little chapel on Ann Street. What a workout that must have been! When we moved to our new building on W. Maple, Redeemer purchased one of the finest organs available. But as the years went by, if you were seated in the choir pews, you would hear the occasional "toot" at inappropriate times, which became a private joke among those in Music Department! Then, as Sacred Space 2 was being designed, it was time for the purchase of another organ to fill the larger space available on the Altar. A significant portion of the Sacred Space 2 budget was used to purchase a top-of-the-line Cassavant organ. And the enormous, bright silver pipes enhance the entire Sanctuary.

Because music is such an integral part of our worship, we have always prioritized the hiring of talented and committed Music Directors and Organists. One of our notable Organists was Myrtle Wuggazer who had a degree from the Detroit Conservatory of Music. Although her primary background was in piano, Myrtle displayed memorable talent on the organ. Redeemer was blessed with the exceptional talents of so many wonderful organists over the decades: Nancy Chesna-Sherman, Nancy Kochenderfer, Dorothy Rohrbach, Jan Pflieger, Ron Hauser, Dave Wagner, and currently our remarkable Rick Helderop. You will learn more about these talented individuals later in this article.

Our Music Directors are also hired with the utmost care. The first Director in our new building on Maple Rd. in 1955 was P.W. Gugel. Nancy Chesna Sherman served as both Choir Director and Organist, from 1947 – 1955. In the Church Council minutes in 1957, she pleaded for new choir members. She was having difficulty getting members for the Senior choir, and asked, "Anyone on the Church Council who can sing should report for rehearsal!" Vaughn Heard served as Music Director from 1955-1957.

L. Vincent and Nancy Lewis Kochenderfer were hired in 1957. Vince earned his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Michigan. He was Chairman of the Music department at Southfield High School, later joining the music staff at Lahser High School where he led the choirs while still directing at Redeemer. Nancy served as Organist from 1957-1981. She graduated from the University of Michigan with a Bachelor's degree in Organ and Music Theory. She went on to get her Masters in Musicology and Advanced Organ Study. Nancy received many accolades throughout the years and was a master at her craft. Nancy and Myrtle would present a Christmas Musicale and Tea annually, with Myrtle playing piano, Nancy playing organ, accompanied by Redeemer soloists. In addition to their work at Redeemer, Vince and Nancy toured with choirs in Europe, South America, and Russia.

Under Vince's direction, Redeemer's choirs soared. Our Children's Choir, directed by Vince, was at least 50 children strong and our Chancel Choir filled the entire pews. During Vince's time as Music Director, our choir programs were so numerous, Redeemer hired a number of other Choir Directors to fill the positions. Gene Guettler, was hired as the Crusader Choir Director (grades 7-9) and Children's Choir (grades 4-6) in 1969. Gene was honored as the State of Michigan's Junior High School Music Director of the Year, also in 1969, and went on to teach music at Oakland Community College. Gene brought a contemporary style of music to Redeemer. He started the 8:30 a.m. Contemporary Service and gave guitar lessons to several of the youth members, who accompanied him at the 8:30 service and lead the Youth Group in singing.

Sadly, Vince Kochenderfer suffered a heart attack in September of 1979 and was not able to return until after Easter 1980. At that time, we were so fortunate to have Mike Dundas step in for him as Interim Director! On January 30, 1982, Redeemer celebrated 25 years of faithful service from Vince and Nancy. There was a lovely program, which included a choral benediction by the present and past members of the Chancel Choir and a choral presentation by the Meadowbrook Estate Singers.

When Vince and Nancy Kochenderfer left Redeemer in 1981, we were blessed by another great couple: Fred and Dorothy Rohrbach. Dorothy was our organist from 1982 – 1990. She studied organ at University of Michigan and Wayne State University, where she was a National Merit Scholar. Dorothy was a Board Member of the American Guild of Organists, a member of the Chorister's Guild, and the Guild of Carillonneurs of North America. In December of 1987, Redeemer replaced our carillon system purchased in 1949. These were called Tower Bells or Arlington Carillon, played from the organ console and purchased from Schulmerich Carillons for \$29, 550.00. Dorothy was given the opportunity to play the Carillon on Christmas Eve in 1987!

Fred Rohrbach earned advanced degrees in Music and Education at Wayne State, Oakland University, and Michigan State University. He directed many choirs in the Detroit area. Fred and Dorothy were social friends with the Kochenderfers and knew of Redeemer's extensive music program. As Fred said, "Sacred music is not a job or hobby for Dorothy and me, but a way of life. We love this work. In our opinion, there is no higher calling for us in the ministry of the church." Lamp 1983. Fred and Dorothy served their Lord at Redeemer from 1982-1990.

In 1985, The congregation made a small change in the worship service, by omitting the "Amen" at the end of the hymns. "Most Protestant denominations and the newer Lutheran hymnals eliminated the amen, as it had no authenticity in historical liturgical practice" (Lamp 1985)

In 1990, Kurt Amolsch came to Redeemer, while also directing choirs and teaching music at Concordia, Ann Arbor. Mary Jo Distler served as our organist with Kurt in 1990. When Kurt left to move to Concordia, River Forest in Masters, IL, we found another gem in Sharon Sweet. Jan Pfleiger became our organist.

Sharon received her master's degree in music from the Eastman School of Music, and taught piano and voice. Sharon was hired in 1994 for a two-fold ministry position – Director of Music and Lay Ministry. Under Sharon's direction, several new choirs were added to our roster: the Cantata Choir, Men's Choir, Redeemer Singers, and a youth ensemble. A Summer Choir was also introduced in 1997 – and according to Beth Lanthier, the added benefit of singing throughout the summer was the fact that the choir didn't have to wear those hot robes!

In 1990, we were blessed by Jan Pflieger's presence behind the organ. Jan served at Redeemer from 1990 – 2013 and is still a member today. Luke Davis served as Music Director from 2001-2003. When Luke left, our beloved Fred Rohrbach returned! He and Dorothy loved their home up north, but he knew that Redeemer needed him. Dorothy was working on another advanced degree, and did not join Fred this time. Also, during this time, Katie Held-Priskorn brought her contemporary style to Redeemer. Katie had led Agape Power at Our Shepherd for many years, and now that she had more ties to Redeemer (daughter-in-law of Gary Priskorn), she started "Celebration", a contemporary choir Redeemer. Katie's piano style was contagious – who wouldn't dance in the pews when she played?

From 2013 – 2015, Ron Hauser was our organist, and from 2017 – 2020 Dave Wagner was behind the organ. Dave is a radio personality as the host of the Morning Show and Drive Time Elixir on 90.9. Dave was also the organist and harpsichordist with the Detroit Symphony!

Where would Redeemer have been without Mike Dundas? Mike has stepped in so many times as Interim Director. He said that his gifts are as a soloist and perhaps assistant director, but he never said no when we were without a director. According to the plaque in the music wing, Mike served from 1979-1980, '81.'93' and 2001. What a blessing he has been to the choir and music program!

Steve SeGraves was hired in 2010 and serves our congregation currently. Steve has a Bachelor's in Music Education from Wayne State, and a Master's in Music Composition from Oakland University. Steve directs the 70 voice Langsford Men's Chorus and the Farmington Community Chorus. Steve's wife, Amy joins Steve in singing with Redeemer Praise.

Our present organist extraordinaire is Rick Helderop. Rick was hired in 2020, and holds a Masters' degree in organ performance from the University of Michigan. Rick has a great sense of humor, which you can "hear" when he plays for the Children's Message and the Mystery Preludes. He also moves pretty quick as he goes from organ to piano and back! Rick owns an organ restoration company, and one of his many talents is repairing and maintaining organs. It is a wonderful blessing to have our own organ in his care.

Our Chancel Choir has always been a prominent presence in our worship services. Back in the Kochenderfer era, the Chancel Choir only sang at the 11:00 service. Our choir featured paid soloists and section leaders, and still does. Some of our beloved soloists were: Phyllis Gaide, Marilyn Truitt, Carl Christensen, Bonnie Brooks, Linda Campbell, Mike Dundas, and Jerry Carlson. Our Chancel Choir also recorded a choir album in 1971. We have an original copy, and hope to hear it playing behind the Town Square slideshow in November! The album retailed for \$3.50, with the proceeds going to defray choir expenses. One other way that the choir covered extra expenses was through the sale of Entertainment Books. Ruth Knudsen was so faithful in selling the books every year. We also received a gift from the Redeemer Bridge League and their work for THAW, which purchased the maroon choir gowns. They were first worn on a Sunday in 1977, when WDIV-TV Channel 4 and News Anchor, Joe Weaver, also a member at Redeemer, filmed all our choirs performing in the Sanctuary. Each year, the Chancel Choir presents two major works. Some of the presentations include: Handel's Messiah, Rutter's Gloria, and Vivaldi's Gloria. God has gifted Redeemer over the years with exceptional, professional choirs. We would be remiss if we did not mention the choir members, who are so faithful in their service, and people such as Henry Moore, choir librarian for many years, and Cherisse Baetz, choir secretary.

Our children's choirs have also enchanted our congregation over the years and they primarily sang at the 9:30 service. Our children would receive a lapel pin for participation, and after a number of years, they would receive a Children's hymnal engraved with their name, and then an engraved Lutheran Hymnal. In 1977, over 200 singers were a part of the five choirs (including the Chancel Choir). Karil Kochenderfer led the Nursery Choir, which numbered 55, Sue Sack directed 38 children in the Cherub Choir, Joan Bowes led a group of 45 children in the Choir, and the Crusader Choir was led by Lee Barton. Other children's choirs throughout the years have been the Alleluia Singers and Jubilant Sound led by Nancy Lesinski and Karen Pridmore, Redeemer Rejoicers led by Beth Lanthier, and our current group, the Redeemer Youth Choir is directed by Nancy Lesinski and accompanied by Nicole Olds. In 1984, the Chorister Choir, led by Sue Sack, began a contest to learn the first verse of as many hymns as they could! Parents were asked to "dust off their hymnals" and help the children learn the hymns.

In the fall of 1983, a 5-octave set of 55 bells was on loan to us from Fred Rohrbach's Bay View Petosky Worship group. The youth bell choir was organized in December for eleven high schoolers, and they learned so fast that they played for Christmas! After that, Fred knew it was time to make this addition to our music department. Donations were made to fund a 4 octave English handbell set. The total cost was \$7500, and the bells were donated in memory of loved ones, with a memorial band placed on the inside of each bell handle. Sue Berry, a well-known handbell clinician, in the area was hired to direct this choir. Beth Lanthier directed the Handbell Choir for many years after Sue left, and today, Jim Compton has done a phenomenal job with the Bell Choir.

Redeemer has long been known in our community for having spirit- inspired choirs, a musical theatrical group known as the "Wing and A Prayer Players", and our very own Brass Ensemble. which over the years has become a fantastic addition to our festival services. Our talented group of brass players include Ed Ahlquist, Tim Springer, Jan McIntyre, and Jimmy Greenwalt, and Andrew Pflieger. Ever popular, this talented group has recently been invited to play many Oktoberfests throughout the community! The Redeemer Brass was started in the mid-90's by Victor Burgess and Ed Ahlquist. It was spun out of the youth group and then participated in some of the big musical presentations such as the Requiem, that involved multiple Redeemer groups.

Our 8:30 contemporary service guitarists were led by Teckla Rosenbusch Rhoads, Dean Western, Kevin Jones, Beth Lanthier, Don Noettl, and Matt Konieczny, who filled the spot for many years. Our 8:00am Sunday and 7:30pm Monday services have been accompanied by pianists Sue Sack, Joan Bowes, Amy Strumolo, and currently, Diane Dorantes.

The Wing and a Prayer Players entertained Redeemer and our community from 1986 – 2019. The original purpose of the group was to "Provide wholesome family-type entertainment, and incidentally, to provide an opportunity for members to invite unchurched family and friends to a fun, no-pressure event with a Christian organization" (Lamp, October 2000).

Pam Dundas directed and wrote many of the plays that were performed. Pam also had roles in a number of the shows, and her performances kept the audience in stitches. One of the shows that Pam wrote was Saints, Sinners, and Some Others, in 1998. "Amazingly, despite the long hours, massive doses of caffeine, and quarts of Mylanta required, she managed to make the whole thing a lot of fun for everyone involved" (Lamp April 1998). Joan Bowes directed all of the music and her talented piano playing kept everyone on the beat and in tune.

Mike Dundas was often the leading man, and he got to kiss a number of church members, that were not his wife. Mike was able to be comic relief as well as being a very serious actor. In, Something's Afoot (2012), he got hit with exploding stairs and took it in stride. In 2010, he played Harold Hill in Music Man, and of course, he was the king in The King and I in 2013.

Some of our leading ladies included Kris Held, Nancy Lesinski, and Bonnie Brooks. Kris had a leading role in She Loves Me (2012), Nancy made a wonderful "swamp princess" in Once Upon a Mattress (1993), and Bonnie was a perfect Marion the Librarian in Music Man in 2012. Other repeat cast members included: Terry Holmes, Jeff Jones, Paul Held, Linda Clark, Bob Ernewin, Linda Campbell, Beth Lanthier, Tim Springer, Sue Sack, and Mike Raezler.

We had some very talented kids at Redeemer, and Pam utilized them in some great shows. Aleea Brooks was in several shows, along with Brendan and Sarah Jane Lesinski. Of course, Shane and Jordan Held followed in their parent's footsteps and joined the casts. Plays such as Narnia, The King and I, Annie, and Are We There Yet?, featured many of our kids. Jono Mammel had a fantastic performance in Are We There Yet?

The Wing and a Prayer Players put on productions for 33 years! It wasn't always easy – lack of storage, makeshift stages, long hours, set building and tearing down, but it was an incredibly rewarding experience for the cast as well as those who came to see the shows. This group of players had a lot of fun. Close friendships were formed, and the group provided, "A slightly looney intergenerational support group for each other" (Lamp, October 2000). If you were fortunate enough to be a part of this group over the years, you know how true this is!

Redeemer has always put an emphasis on music - whether it be the singing of hymns from the pews, or listening to one of our extraordinary choirs. Thanks be to God! In November, we as a country celebrate Veterans Day in order to recognize the service and sacrifice of those who served in the military. Redeemer has a wonderful tradition of recognizing our veterans with the choir singing the service songs of the U.S. Military. Back in World War II, we had a number of Walther Group members and congregants who served. Redeemer was very fortunate to have no casualties among our members. A WWII memorial plaque was created with the names of those serving at the time. As those members returned home safely, their names were taken off the plaque. Later, those names were put on a new plaque and is now mounted on marble and rest on the Redeemer grounds.

In 1945, on the 20th anniversary of the church, Pastor Ted Wuggazer received a number of letters from our service men and women. He would send out a form letter, fondly referred to as a "Red Robin Letter", and they would often write back. Leah Hunt (our only service "girl") wrote, "I hope that by next year the war will be over and we can all be together again." Tom Millenbrandt wrote a letter from the Philippines that said, "I have found that it doesn't make any difference where you worship God, just so that you have the right spirit. I attended service in a beautiful 300-year-old cathedral, and today I worshipped in a church building that was just a skeleton." Sargeant Hubert Tino wrote, "One day, those of us who are absent will return. We will need our church. We pray that it has been, that it is, that it will be."

For several years at our Veterans Day service, Fred Hollis would read a special story about a veteran that became a yearly favorite for those attending service that morning. More recently, Redeemer has a special "sendoff" to those entering the military where they are given a piece of the alter cloth to carry with them. When they return, it is stitched back into place, awaiting the next serviceman or woman who will bear Redeemer's cloth while serving.

We are always grateful that, as a nation, we have a strong military that serves and protects. Closer to home, here at Redeemer, we are always grateful for the rich history we have of our members who have worn the uniform of the United States, taking God with them into the fields.



As another way to honor our 100 years, Ginny Schalm has prepared two very interesting timelines that are now published on our church website. They can also be found in the Theodore Wuggazer Memorial Library.

One is a World Timeline and one is a Christian/Redeemer timeline, both corresponding to the 100 year history of Redeemer. For all you fellow history lovers, please take a look and enjoy!

Redeemer's smallest handbell is under 7 inches tall, and weighs about 7 ounces. The church's largest handbell is nearly 16 inches tall and weighs over 8 pounds. Kristen Rolf usually plays this bell, and has to hold on with two hands! [Those who read music would find the small bell 6 spaces above the top of the treble clef, and the large one two lines below the bottom of the bass clef.] Handbell players always wear gloves to avoid getting hand oils on the bells. Even this procedure doesn't prevent the bells from tarnishing, so the players polish the bells very frequently.




